Answers and Solutions

Q:1 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. only ii. The word 'Season' has two different meanings. First, as a noun, it is used to refer to a period of the year with a particular climate/weather (spring, summer, fall, winter).

Second, as a verb, it means to apply spices or flavorings to food. These spices or flavorings are called seasonings.

Now, in the sentence (A) the word 'season' is used for the climate seasons i.e. 'rainy period of the year'. Moving towards the sentences (i) – "dry season" & (iii) - "spring season", it is used in the same manner with the same meaning. But, in the sentence (ii), the word 'season' is used as a verb and refers to adding spices or flavors to the chicken dish.

Hence, in sentences (i) & (iii) the word 'season' is used in the same way it is used in the given sentence (A), but, in the sentence (ii) it is used in a different meaning.

Q:2 The correct answer is option 5 i.e. all i, ii, & iii. The word 'Bolt' has three different meanings. First, it is used to refer a bar that slides into a socket to fasten a door or window.

Second, The word 'bolt' is also used for a single ray of lightning (a lightning bolt).

And third, it is also meant to move or run away suddenly in an attempt to escape.

In sentence A, the word 'bolt' is used for a single ray of lightning.

Moving towards (i) & (ii) the word 'bolt' is used to refer a bar that slides into a socket to fasten a door or window.

And in sentence (iii) it is used in the sense of 'move or run away suddenly in an attempt to

Therefore, all of the given sentences used the word 'bolt' in different meanings to sentence A.

Q:3 The correct answer is option 5, i.e. British

writers and statesmen also used their criticism of Indian culture and society to justify British political and economic domination over India.

The question is to find out the correct statement representing the given vocab.

The term 'Justify' means to show or prove to be right or reasonable.

Among the given statements, option 5 seems to portray the exact denotation of the provided word. Hence, the correct answer will be option 5, i.e. British writers and statesmen also used their criticism of Indian culture and society to justify British political and economic domination over India.

Now, in sentence A, 'lead' is used as a verb and guiding Aarushi to her sister's house. Sentence (i) & (ii) use the word in the same sense. In sentence (i) The principle at work in this technology could guide us to a cure for other autoimmune diseases and in sentence (ii) a few trends or developments that guide us toward peace. But in the sentence (iii) it is used as a noun and refers to the lead metal.

Q:5 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. Both i & iii. The word 'minute' can be used in different ways with different meanings. As a verb and noun, it can be used as a period of time. Also, it can be used to refer to a summarized record of the proceedings at a meeting. Moreover, as an adjective, the word 'minute' means extremely small.

In sentence A, the word 'minute' is used to refer to the time period. And in sentence (ii) 'minute' is used in the same way where it refers to the time

In sentence (i), 'minute' refers to extremely small, i.e. Joe is capable of telling the extremely small shades difference the size of the thread. In sentence (iii), 'minute' refers to the summarized record of the proceedings at a meeting.

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Thus, in sentences (i) & (iii) the word 'minute' is used in different meanings to sentence A.

Q:6 The correct answer is option 4 i.e. only iii. The word 'entrance' has multiple meanings: As a noun, an entrance is a point of access and entry. Now, here in sentence A, 'entrance' is used as a noun and refers to the entry point. Similarly, in sentences (i) & (ii), it refers to the point of entry. Moving ahead, the word 'entrance' in sentence (iii), used as a verb which is used to describe how the beauty of the city filled the author with wonder and delight. So, sentence (iii) gives a different meaning to the given sentence A. Hence option D is the correct

Q:7 The correct answer is Option 3 i.e. Only D. The given word "levy" refers 'to a charge, such as a tax, fine, or other fee, that is imposed on something."

Among the given sentences, the word has been used appropriately only in the sentence "D". Hence, the correct answer is **Option 3** i.e. **Only D.**
