#### Answers and Solutions

#### Q:1 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. bird's eye view

#### Let us look at the meaning of the idioms.

Blind date - a social meeting with an unknown person with a view to developing a romantic or sexual relationship.

Body and soul - to do something with all of one's effort and ability.

Bird's eye view - to have a broader view of a situation or place.

Blind alley - an alley or road that is closed at one end.

Hence, bird's eye view is the correct answer.

#### Q:2 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. She missed the exam as she felt under the weather.

The meaning of the idiom under the weather is feeling sick, especially sick with the flu or a common cold.

The sentence can also be written as she missed the exam as she was sick with flu.

Hence, she missed the exam as she felt under the **weather** is the correct answer.

#### Q:3 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. At a loss or perplexed

The meaning of the idiom 'At sea' is to be in a state of confusion. It is as if one has gotten lost at sea. Hence, At a loss or perplexed is the correct answer.

# Q:4 The correct answer is option 2 i.e. Smiling

The meaning of the idiom beaming from ear to ear' is to have a a broad, enthusiastic smile. It is like the smile extends from one ear to another. Hence, Smiling broadly is the correct answer.

#### Q:5 The correct answer is option 2 i.e. An inflexible person who is hard to convince.

The meaning of the idiom 'hard nuts to crack' is that it is difficult to do or to understand.

Hence, an inflexible person who is hard to convince is the correct answer.

#### Q:6 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. To offer sumptuous food to one's guests

The idiom to keep a good table means to be a good host.

Hence, To offer sumptuous food to one's guests is the correct answer.

#### Q:7 The correct answer is option 2 i.e. To begin a conversation to relieve the tension in an uncomfortable situation

The idiom 'Break the ice' means to say something or start a conversation to release tension when strangers meet.

Hence, To begin a conversation to relieve the tension in an uncomfortable situation is the correct answer

#### Q:8 The correct answer is option 3 i.e Look very similar in appearance or character

The idiom 'Teo peas in a pod' mean two people who are very close to each other or are very similar.

Hence, Look very similar in appearance or **character** is the correct answer.
