#### Answers and Solutions

#### Q:1 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. At the very last minute

Idioms: A group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words.

'At the eleventh hour' means the latest possible moment.

Example: She postponed her trip at the eleventh hour.

#### Q:2 The correct answer is Option 3 i.e. Doing wrong thing to achieve something intended.

In the given question, we need to select the meaning of the given idiom.

An **IDIOM** refers to 'a group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words'.

#### Let's have a look at the meaning of the given idiom:-

Bark up the wrong tree- to be wrong about the reason for something or the way to achieve something; to make the wrong choice; to ask the wrong person; to follow the wrong course; doing wrong thing to achieve something intended.

For example: - Her husband thinks she's under suspicion, but I'm sure he's barking up the wrong tree.

The meaning of the given idiom is the same as the chosen option hence, it will be correct.

Q:3 The correct answer is Option 3 i.e. Impossible. In the given question, we need to select the meaning of the given idiom.

An **IDIOM** refers to 'a group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words'.

#### Let's have a look at the meaning of the given idiom:-

Out of the question- too impracticable or unlikely to merit discussion; not possible or allowed.

For example: - Asking my mother for money was

Asutosh Mukherjee Road, College Para, Hathi More, Siliguri, West Bengal

completely *out of the question*.

The meaning of the given idiom is the same as the chosen option hence, it will be correct.

#### Q:4 The correct answer is Option 1 i.e. End the quarrel and make peace.

In the given question, we need to select the meaning of the given idiom.

An **IDIOM** refers to 'a group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words'.

Every cloud has a silver lining- every difficult or sad situation has a comforting or more hopeful aspect, even though this may not be immediately apparent; no matter how bad a situation might seem, there is always some good aspect to it.

For example: - She told us about her resignation an absolute disaster at the time, but *every cloud* has a silver lining because it led to my appointment.

The meaning of the given idiom is the same as the chosen option hence, it will be correct.

#### Q:8 The correct answer is Option 3 i.e. To attempt something impossible.

In the given question, we need to select the meaning of the given idiom.

An **IDIOM** refers to 'a group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words'.

#### Let's have a look at the meaning of the given idiom:-

To square the circle- to solve, or attempt to solve, an impossible (or seemingly impossible) problem or situation; to attempt something impossible.

For example: - 'Nirvana' squared the circle by making a record that was pop and rock at the same time.

The meaning of the given idiom is the same as the chosen option hence, it will be correct.

#### Q:9 The correct answer is option 4 i.e. Behaviour that is not acceptable or is dishonest.

Idioms: A group of words established by usage as


having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words.

'Monkey business' means behaviour that is not acceptable or is dishonest

Example: There's been some monkey business going on here!

Q:10 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. Ultimately. Idioms: A group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words.

'In the long run' means the eventually. Example: They will win out in the long run.
