Answers and Solutions

Q:1 The correct answer is option 4 i.e. To become less important or to give up control over things.

The meaning of the given idiom is-

To take a back seat- to allow somebody to play a more important or active role than you do in a particular situation.

As the meaning of the given idiom is the same as the chosen option it will be correct.

Q:2 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. Close contest that ends in a tie.

The meaning of the given idiom is-

Dead heat- the result of a race when two people, etc. finish at exactly the same time.

As the meaning of the given idiom is same as the chosen option it will be correct.

Q:3 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. Come to the original point.

The meaning of the given idiom is-

Back to square one-back to where one started, with no progress having been made.

As the meaning of the given idiom is same as the chosen option it will be correct.

Q:4 The correct answer is Option 4 i.e. Disturb the working of.

In the given question, we need to select the meaning of the given idiom.

An **IDIOM** refers to 'a group of words established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words'.

Let's have a look at the meaning of the given idiom:-

Throw out of gear- stop something from working normally; to cause some process or situation to begin no longer function or operate normally, ideally, or as desired.

For example: The fanatics have thrown out of *gear* many of our important industries.

The meaning of the given idiom is the same as the

chosen option hence, it will be correct.

Q:5 The correct answer is option 2 i.e. A person who is very dear.

The meaning of the given idiom, 'Apple of one's eye' is a person of whom one is extremely fond and proud.

The correct choice among the given options is 'A person who is very dear.'

Q:6 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. An obvious issue left unaddressed due to its sensitivity.

The meaning of the given idiom, **Elephant in the room'** is a major problem or controversial issue which is obviously present but is avoided as a subject for discussion.

The most appropriate choice among the given options is **An obvious issue left unaddressed due** to its sensitivity.

Q:7 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. To set high goals

The meaning of the given idiom, 'To aim for the stars' is 'To aim high; to set lofty goals.'

The most appropriate choice among the given options is 'to set high goals.'

Q:8 The correct answer is option 3 i.e. Be patient. The meaning of the given idiom, 'Hold your horses' is 'wait a moment'.

The most appropriate choice among the given options is 'Be patient'.

Q:9 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. To cry suddenly.

The meaning of the given idiom, 'To break into tears' is to start to cry.

Thus, the most appropriate option would be 'to cry suddenly'.

Q:10 The correct answer is option 1 i.e. To escape. The meaning of the given idiom, 'to break loose' is ' to suddenly become loose'.

Thus, the most appropriate choice among the given options is 'to escape'.
